Hiring the Professional

- Contact one or more professionals noting credentials, experience, fees, and services. Evaluate their experience related to your particular problem.
- Inform the professional about your goals and specify your expectations. State limitations clearly, before you engage professional services. Be sure that you and the professional agree about what will be done.
- Ask about fees and out-of-pocket expenses. The majority of professionals charge \$30-\$60 per hour, although fees can range from \$10-\$100 per hour. Expect to pay a retainer in advance.
- Communicate everything you already know to your professional. That is the only way to insure that he/she doesn't duplicate what you've already done.

What Services Are Available?

Generally, professional genealogists offer services in two categories: *doing research* for hire, or lending expertise as a *consultant*.

RESEARCH: Professional genealogists may do research for hire based on their knowledge of, and access to resources for a particular area of expertise. The APG researchers specialize in many different areas, including:

- Geographic research;
- Ethnic groups;
- Overseas research:
- Research in specific time periods;
- Lineage society applications;
- Specific types of records, such as land or military records;
- · Complete family genealogies.

CONSULTING: Professional genealogists also offer expertise as consultants that may increase your effectiveness in both conducting research and communicating your research results. For example, a professional can help you:

- Plan research strategies;
- Evaluate evidence;
- Produce a family history book;
- Develop a website;
- Organize documents and photos;
- Plan a family reunion.

Help From an APG Professional

When her grandmother died, Sandy inherited several unorganized boxes of old family pictures and papers. APG Code of Ethics

Every member of APG signs a code of professional ethics. The Code of Ethics states that the professional will:

- Promote a coherent, truthful approach to genealogy, family history and local history;
- Clearly present research results and opinions in a clear, well-organized manner, with accurately-cited references;
- Advertise services and credentials honestly;
- Explain without concealment or misrepresentation all fees, charges, and payment structures;
- Abide by agreements regarding project scope, number of hours, and deadlines or reporting schedules;
- Refrain from knowingly violating or encouraging others to violate laws and regulations concerning copyright and right to privacy;
- Give proper credit to those who supply information and provide assistance.
