Note: This was updated on 2 October 2005 with more information learned about:

- 1. the family of Elizabeth Hutchinson Margam (updated Appendix D), and
- 2. a few bits 'n pieces about John Tudor, wife of Jane Hutchinson and then Sarah Hutchinson (half-sister of Jane)!

Note: This was again updated on 6 October 2005 with more information learned about Edgar Robert Hutchinson (added Appendix E) ... he is the individual who became a clergyman for the Church of England.

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JANE HUTCHINSON

This has been an exciting bit of research ... it's one of the few cases where all the pieces suddenly fell into place -- not only was her ancestry determined and unexpected linkages to other "known" bits of information surfaced!

From the main body of research you might remember the following facts:

- 1. James Hutchinson and probably first wife Martha had a daughter Jane who was listed in the 1841 census as born about 1826 "Out of County." We do not see her listed in the 1851 census. She would be a half sister to James Hutchinson Jr.
- 2. There are 3 TUDOR burials in Llangynwyd:

Irene Jane 7 May 1881 Horse & Groom aged 14m (daughter of John & Sarah Tudor)

Jane 4 Sep 1874 Commercial St., 48 (Don't know who this is!ⁱ) John 13 Nov 1891 Horse & Groom, 53

3. We had researched the TUDOR family because in 1881, at "The Horse and Groom" we find John and Sarah Tudor where Sarah was born Sarah Hutchinson, daughter of James Hutchinson Sr and sibling of James Hutchinson Jr. Sarah married John Tudor in 1875.

Well, what we have since learned is

- 1. that the Jane Tudor who died in 1874 was born Jane Hutchinson and was the daughter Jane listed in the 1841 census in other words, a half-sister to Sarah
- 2. her first husband, Charles Lewton, was the earlier proprietor of "The Horse and Groom."
- 3. subsequently, Charles died, Jane Hutchinson Lewton married John Tudor, Jane died and then John married her sister Sarah! Phew ... what a family affair!

Now for the juicy details ...

It all started with the following excerpt ...

"The Old Parish Public Houses Past and Present II" John Lyons, 1987.

Horse and Groom, 128 Commercial Street, Maesteg The Original licensed house of this name dates back at least to 1841.

Cardiff & Merthyr Guardian, 9th August 1845

A convivial meeting called a Pie (Pye) was held at the Horse and Groom, Maesteg. Many young persons congregated in a room over the brew house. In the brew house there was a large boiler of scalding water when suddenly the floor gave way but the boards on the floor wedged themselves into a shape of a "V". No one was scalded, only slight injuries occurred. An Irishman who was a spectator to the whole event stated "That they had escaped death by the will of God."

In 1846 Charles Lewton Brains married Jane Hutchinson, whose father James Hutchinson was a publican, and later kept the old Farmers Arms, Maesteg.

Charles Lewton (dropping the name Braine) went on to keep the Horse and Groom. He died in 1868. The following appeared in the Glamorgan Gazette November, 1868."



Some things to note from this description are:

1. it refers to the father James Hutchinson as a publican keeping the old Farmers Arms ... well, he was a farmer till 1861 when he was at the helm of the "Horse and Groom," the year we now find that his daughter was keeping at the "Horse and Groom" ... and then he died before 1871 ... so, not much of a career at it!

- 2. we do recognize the "Horse and Groom" since Sarah Hutchinson became the 2nd wife of John Tudor and so this premise was already discussed in the Hutchinson Family Appendices covering the period of 1881+
- 3. it gives a marriage date of 1846 -- confirmed (see below) and we can them in the 1851 census (see below)!

Looking at some <u>directories</u> for the period ... always remembering that there are gaps in the directories, that one normally had to pay to be included and so they are not comprehensive and that errors are frequent!

"I discovered a reference in the swearing-in book for the Glamorgan Constabulary (ref.: DCON1), where John Tudor is listed as having been sworn in to the force on 12 May 1860. Unfortunately, I was unable to find any further information on John Tudor amongst our records."

- 1. no entry for any Lewton's or Brain's or the "Horse & Groom" in an 1852-3 Directory
- 2. we find in an 1865 directoryⁱⁱ, the following entry notice the spelling of her name and why isn't Charles listed ... he's still alive as far as we know!

Luton, Jane, Horse and Grown, butcher and grocer, Massteg

3. an 1866 directory has an equally "butchered (no pun intended)" listing of the name

Lenton Chas., Horse and Groom, butcher and grocer, Massing

4. interesting ... an 1871 directory lists Robert Hutchinson as the proprietor of the Horse and Groom! Though for the 1871 census he was living in town with his family and working as a Carrier... so, was he "holding" it for his sister? John Tudor is not listed

5. an 1875 directory lists John Tudor at the helm and this confirms his marriage to Jane Lewton

This leads one to looking at census records ...

Look to <u>Page 6</u> ... for the discovery that "cracked the case of Jane!" -- basically the 1851 census!

1871 Census^{vii}, Maesteg, Bridgend, Glamorgan 75 Commercial St. (Horse & Groom) Jane Lewton, Head, W, 40, Licensed Victualler, Somerset, Leigh

Note: we learned the following from the Glamorgan Reference Office though at this time it has not been pursued:

"I have checked our records and we have a register of licences granted in 1872-1873 in the Newcastle Petty Sessions area (which includes Maesteg, ref. P/SNEW 10/1-2). The information in the volume includes the type of licence granted, the name and situation of the property, the name and address of the owner and the name of the licence holder."

1881 Census ... John Tudor is now married to Sarah Hutchinson and still at the Horse & Groom as reported in the Hutchinson Family Appendices. It appears that in 1871 he was a police constable living in Michaelston super Avon ... which is shown as Cwmafan on the map ... so we can see that it was just a few miles west of Maesteg. And, the 1861 census has him as a police officer living in Llangynwyd!

If you read the box to the right ... this gives an over view of the BIG LEAP that occurred and tied all these threads together ... an amazing bit of serendipity, some record availability and the kindness of genealogy listers made this all happen!

Okay ... now for the details to substantiate the synopsis given in the box!

Marriage^x:

James Hutchinson, bachelor, Abbots Leigh Mar Atkins, spinster, Long Ashton 26 April 1824, Long Ashton, Banns

Baptismsxi:

Jane Hutchinson, daughter of James and Martha, 29 April 1827, Abbots Leigh

Anne Hutchinson, daughter of James and Martha, 13 February 1825, Abbots Leigh

Now, there was also a baptism for: George Hutchinson, son of Robert and Anna, 18 March 1821 ... we do eventually have a Robert Hutchinson in Glamorgan having come from Westmorland ... is this him and is he related to James?

Okay ... armed with this info ... we used a different, more complete source, for looking for a marriage between Jane Hutchinson and Charles Lewton and it was foundxii!

(This is where we learned that Jane came from Abbots Leigh and this led to the discovery of the relevant birth and marriage – also, note that Charles is now listed as from Bitton GLS instead of Kingswood SOM!)

We know that in 1841, Jane was living with her father and stepmother in Maesteg, Bridgend. So, where was Charles living? Well, we find that his family was also in Maesteg.

Aha ... have tracked Jane Lewton (nee Hutchinson) through her marriage to Charles Lewton ... found him & family in 1841 and Charles & Jane in 1851 ... in both cases just down the street from her father on Bowrington in Maesteg! The 1851 entry was significant as it states her birth place as Abbots Leigh Somerset (so, now we know which Leigh).

Using this information from www.familyhistoryonline.net, we then looked for a marriage for James Hutchinson to Martha (mother of Jane) ... Yes ... found an 1824 marriage in Long Ashton of James Hutchinson, Abbots Leigh to Mar Atkins of Long Ashton! Abbots Leigh matches birthplace of Jane, obviously James Hutchinson matches her father and Mar could be Martha! And, a lister found a baptism for Jane, daughter of James and Martha Hutchinson! Apparently she also had a sister baptized in 1825 ... have to figure that she died before 1841 or left home early!

This tells us that at a minimum, James Hutchinson was born in Westmorland, migrated to Abbots Leigh Somerset and then moved to Bridgend Glamorgan ... there are also Robert and George Hutchinson who migrated from Stavely Westmorland to Glamorgan -- are they related?

> NOTE: Apparently Lewton and Brain are fairly common names in the Bitton and Kingswood villages of Gloucestershire if one examines the burial index for this area... apparently, this branch migrated to Glamorgan.

So, we can go forward to 1851 ... also remember the death information that we have for the 1850s for Samuel Lewton Brain and Ann Lewton Brain ... this confirms that they were probably the parents of Charles ... still trying to figure out where Waunlas Cottages fits in!

We've lost William and James Since these are collateral lines ... we won't work too hard to find them in 1851 ... let's go forward to 1861. We know we won't find the parents in 1861 (as they died earlier) ... where are the children ... we have Charles at the "Horse & Groom" and we find Samuel in Chichester!

Looking for the siblings after 1851 ... we find:



National Gazetteer (1868) - Abbots Leighxviii

"ABBOT'S LEIGH, a parish in the hundred of Portbury, union of Bedminster, in the county of Somerset, 3 miles N.W. of Bristol, and 120 from London by the Great Western railway. The living is a vicarage* in the diocese of Gloucester, value £77, and in the patronage of the Bishop of Gloucester and Bristol. The church, which was formerly much decayed, has been lately restored by P. Miles, Esq., M.P., of Leigh Court, who has a fine picture gallery. The village, which commands a view of the Bristol Channel, is situated on the river Avon, near Rownham Ferry, and was formerly the property of St. Augustine's-Abbey."



Long Ashton, Somerset

National Gazetteer (1868) – Long Ashton^{xx}

"LONG ASHTON, a parish in the hundred of Hartcliffe-with-Bedminster, in the county of Somerset, 2 miles to the S. W. of Bristol. It is situated in a wooded valley of great beauty, on the river Avon, which separates it from Gloucestershire, and at the foot of the Dundry hills. The village occupies the slope of Ashton Hill, and from the road which passes through it there are charming views of the valley, the river, Bristol, Clifton, and the scattered villages in Gloucestershire. In this parish are comprised the hamlets of Bower-Ashton, Kingcott, Providence, Yanleigh and Rownham. The living is a vicarage* in the diocese of Bath and Wells, value £450, in the patronage of W. G. Langton, Esq., and Sir J. Smyth, Bart."


All Saints, Long Ashton ... this would be the church that James Hutchinson and Martha Atkins married in.

The research on Jane reminded us that we lost site of Elizabeth Hutchinson in 1841 also ... so, let's see if we can figure what happened to her.

Since Elizabeth's entry is starred .. we focused on the star entries figuring that they were indexed by the same person.

Well, when we research this further ... we can eliminate Griffith Hopkin as in 1861 we find him with a wife Jennet! So, let's now try Margam/Mongam ... see what happens!

Okay ... we find in 1861 that Moses has a wife Elizabeth and their first son was named James ... so, it's a good possibility!

Looking at FreeBMD ... we learn that she appears to have died after giving birth to a daughter Ann – who also is not listed in 1871 (remember that these indexes are incomplete). Note also that daughter Elizabeth married in 1868

(NOTE: expect that Elizabeth Ann is a daughter of one of the Margam sons)

It ends up that there was an article written up on Moses Margam ... as he was a foundling left in Margam, hence his surname!

The particulars on the article are:

"Phillips, Cyril. Moses Margam, a foundling, 1819-1889. Port Talbot Historian 4/2 (2000), p. 51-57"

We were able to obtain a copy of this from the Bridgend BCBC Library Services^{xxvi}. It is a fascinating bit of research into the life of Moses, which had its hardships.

"It appears that he [Moses Margam] then left the Kenfig Hill area and joined the exodus to the rapidly expanding industrial town of Maesteg. Here he met Elizabeth Hutchinson, the daughter of James Hutchinson, who supplied the horses operating the Dyffryn Llynfi and Porthcawl Railway. They were married in Llangynwyd Parish Church on 14th August 1847 by the Reverend Richard Pendrill Llewelyn, vicar of the parish, after Banns. Moses and Elizabeth both signed in a neat hand. Their first child, James, was born on 5th November 1847."

This was interesting to read, as though we knew that James was a farmer, before becoming an innkeeper ... we had no idea what that meant. So, this seems to indicate that the raising of horses may have been part of what James did. The article goes on to describe the birth of their children as well as their movement from Maesteg to Taibabh and then a return to Maesteg where Elizabeth died in 1864. The next interesting bit as far as the Hutchinson family link goes is

"...However, in 1873 a depression in trade caused the closure of Maesteg Ironworks, greatly reducing activity in the coal mines and tinworks. Large numbers

of workers emigrated to North America; among them were Moses Margam, his sons James, Moses and William and his daughter Catherine ... The destination decided upon, Canada, may have been chosen as it is believed that some other relatives of the Hutchinson Family went to Nova Scotia. As far as can be determined, they left around 1875 and went to Toronto and Montreal."

So, this has an interesting mention of a Hutchinson emigrating to Canada. Looking at the siblings of Elizabeth, the only one not accounted for is William. He was born c. 1843 and we lose him between the 1861 and the 1871 census! Did William emigrate to Canada?

We do find an entry in the 1881 Canadian Census xxvii

Appendix E Edgar Robert Hutchinson

When researching Edgar Robert Hutchinson, we had come across a mention of Normal Training College. We have since been trying to verify his attendance at the college xxviii.

"We have manage[d] to locate Edgar R Hutchinson's name in the Admissions book Reference UA21/2/2. He started at the college in 1881 and would have been a student for 2 years. The record shows that he was a pupil teacher at the Board School in Bridgend and that in the Queen's Scholars Exam he passed at 2nd Class level. The Queen's Scholars Exam was taken prior to entry to the college."
